ASHLAND LODGE NO. 277, A.F. & A.M.

No history of the Ashland community and its beginnings would be complete without a brief history of Ashland Lodge No. 277, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons.

The Ashland Lodge traces its start back to a meeting of Master Masons held on March 27, 1886, less than a year and a half after Ashland itself was founded. A large number of the brethren (settlers who had previously joined the Masonic fraternity elsewhere) were present at the initial meeting called for the purpose of petitioning for a new Lodge in Ashland.

Later meetings in 1886 and 1887 were held "under dispensation" from the Grand Lodge of Kansas until the Ashland Lodge received its official warrant, constitution and charter from the Grand Lodge on March 22, 1887. Elected and installed as officers were: Cale W. Carson, Worshipful Master; Samuel H. Cummins, Senior Warden; George E. Gage, Junior Warden; George A. Blair, Treasurer; and Thomas E. Berry, Secretary.

Minutes of the early meetings indicate that Lodge dues at that time were set at \$2.00 per year. Among the bylaws recommended for adoption was one declaring that "the Tiler of the Lodge shall receive \$1.00 for each meeting tiled by him, provided he act as janitor, and nothing if he does not."

For 90 years the Lodge Hall was located on the second floor of the building that currently houses the *Clark County Clipper* office, sharing the hall for many years with the Odd Fellows Lodge. In the spring of 1977, recognizing a need for more convenient facilities, the brethren sold their building and purchased

a ground-floor building across the street north of the present post office.

Utilizing volunteer labor from both Lodge and Eastern Star members, and many generous contributions from members in Ashland and elsewhere, the interior of the building was completely remodeled at a cost of several thousand dollars. Ray Crosby served as the able chairman of the building committee.

The "new" hall was occupied by the Lodge in October of 1977, and has since provided modern and convenient meeting facilities for the Lodge and a large public meeting room on Ashland Main Street which is used regularly for various community meetings and activities.

Down through the years the membership roster of Ashland Lodge No. 277 has included many of the leading business and professional men of the Ashland area, as well as a good representation from the farming and ranching community. To attempt to name them would take up far more space than is available in the brief history.

The Masonic fraternity has always been, and is today, a force for good in the Ashland community. Today the Lodge--about 100 members strong--continues to meet twice monthly on the second and fourth Thursdays. The local members practice their craft as Masons have practiced it since time immemorial . . . with a special emphasis on the basic tenets of Freemasonry--brotherly love, relief and truth.

An educational and philanthropic organization, it assists women, including those from foreign countries, who seek higher education. It owns and supports Cottey Junior College for Women at Nevada, Missouri. Nine girls from Ashland have attended Cottey, twelve have received college loans, and one, a grant.

Chapter BA helped the Red Cross effort during both World Wars. They sponsored rook parties, plays, held bake sales, sold Christmas cards and candy to raise money for a library. Many members have served on the Library Board.

Social functions include parties and picnics for husbands or families. For over forty years a luncheon meeting has been held in observance of Founders' Day. A reciprocity group of nine chapters from this area was organized in 1941, and meets annually in April.

VETERANS' ORGANIZATIONS

This article is intended to give a brief history of the men whose names identify veterans' organizations in the Ashland community:

Major Elliott Post, Grand Army of the Republic (G.A.R.) was "organized and mustered in" at Ashland on April 22, 1887. Major Elliott served under General George Custer. While stationed at Camp Supply, Oklahoma Territory, in 1868, Elliott was ordered by Custer to attack an Indian camp on the Washita River. The Kiowa Indian Chief, Black Kettle, along with about 100 other Indians, was killed. In his apparent zeal, Major Elliott pursued the fleeing Indians and in so doing, was himself killed.

Harry Baker Post, American Legion, was organized in the years immediately following World War I. Harry Baker was a native of Ashland, one of seven children of Mr. and Mrs. Addison Baker. Harry was a ranch hand, single and one of the early casualties of World War I.

Willard Aldridge Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars was organized June 9, 1946. Willard, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Aldridge, was reared on a farm north of Sitka. He was one of ten children, and had three brothers who served in World War II. Willard was killed at Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941, when his ship, the Battleship Oklahoma, was sunk.

WILLARD ALDRIDGE VFW POST 7770

The VFW Post was organized June 9, 1946. There were 45 names on the charter with 21 recruits present at the first meeting. The meeting was held in the Odd Fellows Hall. The Pratt Earl H. Ellis Post Degree Team with Fred J. Terryman, Senior Vice-Commander in Command, placed the new post in operation and gave the obligation to the recruits.

They delayed giving the Post an official name because so many recruits were not present because of harvest. It was called Clark

County Post 7770 until a more suitable name could be chosen. Officers were elected: Paul Joe Myers, Commander; J.C. Berryman, Senior Vice-Commander; Bill Beydler, Junior Vice-Commander; Dean Matthews, Chaplain; John Foster, Quartermaster; Dr. Jerry McNickle, Post Surgeon. Post advocate was left open until next meeting. Raymond Schwartz, 3 year director; Donald Reed, 2 year director; Bill Martin, 1 year director. Commander, Paul Joe Myers appointed J.D. Lynch, officer of the

day; Dean Matthews, service officer; Harold Riley, adjutant.

An early meeting place was the basement under Zimmerman Hardware. The basement on South Main was built in 1951 and was Post Home until 1976. They entered into an agreement with American Legion Harry Baker Post 89 to lease their building with an option to buy in 1981. It was agreed the building would be

called Veterans Memorial Building.

The VFW is a service organization. One of their projects is supplying crutches, wheel chairs, hospital beds, etc., for people to use at home.

Y.W.C.A.

The Young Women's Christian Association seeks to develop members physically, mentally and spiritually and to bring together women and girls of diverse experience and faith.

In the early twenties (1920's) young ladies teaching in small Kansas towns, who had enjoyed belonging to Y.W.C.A. in college, wanted the high school girls to share the same experience. Interested advisors and women in the community organized the Ashland Y.W.C.A. and the charter from the Kansas District (with headquarters in Wichita) was granted in 1926. There are 7 other districts in the U.S., but the Kansas District is considered one of the largest in the world both in area and in membership.

Newspaper articles mention the extistence of the Y.W.C.A. in Ashland as early as 1918; existing records show the first president to be Mrs. Anna Mary Henderson Alger (1927-1928) who was a former Girl Reserve sponsor.

Mrs. J.E. Humphreys, Mrs. H.A. Mull, Mrs. John York and Mrs. W.A. Shattuck have served as board members to the Kansas District Y.W.C.A.

UNITED NATIONS WEEKEND A Y.W.C.A. PROJECT

In 1953, the Y.W.C.A. theme of the year was "To help fortify freedom with faith and fellowship." To carry out this theme, the Ashland Y.W.C.A. planned an experience in international living. Foreign students who were enrolled in area colleges were invited to Ashland for a United Nations Weekend.

Eight students from Phillips University, Enid, Oklahoma, representing five foreign countries, were transported to Ashland. They stayed in homes and participated in various activities of their choice. There was a community get-together of hosts, guests and others on Saturday night. They became acquainted and enjoyed food, fun and entertainment. Sunday the students attended the church of their choice, and were returned to their schools after a meal.

In the early years of this project, the Y.W.C.A. president and project chairman spent many hours on campuses, visiting with students, acquainting them with the aims of the project and assuring them that they would have no expense and were not being exploited. The project grew for nineteen years, from eight students representing one college and five countries, to some seventy students from six universities representing sixty countries. A project such as this does much to further international peace as proven by the many students who have kept in touch with host families and Ashland friends for many years.

Noriyuki Fujii, who was a guest in 1956, graduated from Wichita Unviersity in 1958. He returned to Japan and was later president of Empire Tourist Service in Tokyo. In 1975, he called the Ashland Chamber of Commerce and asked permission to visit our community with a group of thirty-two young people on a "Japanese Goodwill Mission." The purpose was to make friends with American working youth and women, and to observe work-

ing conditions in this country. After the visit in Ashland by these young people, Mr. Fujii said, "I've never forgotten the most wonderful experience of my life, a United Nations Weekend in Ashland, Kansas."

The United Nations Weekend project had the cooperation and participation of many people in the community. The last United Nations Weekend was held the weekend of October 21, 1971.

THE ARTLAND BUILDING

The building that houses The Artland Gallery was first owned by Thomas Berry. The next owner was M.L. Doom, in 1887. The same year M.S. and J.A. Blooser were the owners. In 1910, the owner was Robert Mayse. In 1910, J.G. Brown was the owner and it housed the Harry Brown Bakery. In 1911, Irvin Brown became the owner. In 1912, it was owned by J.W. Berryman and housed the Schamo Grocery and Bakery. In 1934, this building was owned by Home Lumber and Supply Company, who leased to Elmo Johnson Buick Agency. In 1945, Lewis George bought the building and went into partnership with Elmo. The building has since been used for the school lunch room and bus garage. A new high school was built, so they used the new cafeteria for school lunches. In 1964, the building was turned over to Frank Brewer as an art building. Mr. Brewer left in 1967, Nadine



George put in art supplies and sells art work on commission. It is known to be the best art gallery between Wichita and Taos!

ASHCRAFT DRUG STORE

Walter C. Ashcraft came to Ashland from Wichita, Kansas, in 1923 and bought the Sidenstricker Drug Store where Walkers is now located. He and his high school sweetheart, Joanna Coble, from Sedgwick, Kansas, were married in 1925. She worked faithfully by his side to build the Ashcraft Drug Company which had these slogans: "The Store You Can Patronize With Confidence" and "You Are Always Welcome at Ashcraft's."

There were five young men who started behind the fountain at Ashcraft's and later became pharmacists. They were Victor Burton, Russell Brown, Francis Andrews, Lynn Burton and Corwin McIntyre. Jerry McNickle and Walter Coble Ashcraft started behind the fountain and became doctors.

Mr. Ashcraft had air conditioning installed in the store and it was the first ever seen in Ashland. The customers soon flocked in to enjoy sodas in cool comfort.

In 1948, he bought out the Rexall Drug Store from Russell Charles. He remodeled it into a fifty foot front building, taking in the building formerly occupied by the B.T. Broadie Men's Clothing. His decoration with the brands of local ranchers and farmers became quite a conversation piece. Once a California tourist, after stopping at the fountain for refreshments, said, "Well, sir, if there is a store as fine as this in Los Angeles, I have never found it."

The thing that others will remember the longest about Walter Ashcraft is that he was eminently successful in his chosen line of business, and he gained that success through the integrity and ability that created for him a public confidence seldom achieved in commercial life.

ASHLAND OIL COMPANY

During the middle 1920's, a number of farmers in Clark County decided to organize and buy their own lubricating needs for their machinery by the carload. This was done under the encouragement of the Farm Bureau and was so successful that the organization of Ashland Oil was formed. In 1927, they purchased the property where they are now located. It was a small building having one 10 gallon visible pump. A bigger building was built and service facilities added and a manager was hired. Mr. Ray Crosby was hired as manager, Charley Hill was tank wagon man and Lee Landers was attendant.

The first electric operated gas pumps in Ashland were later added and the buildings improved until 1950, when the present building was opened, providing full service for cars, tractors, and other machinery used in this area. The first rubber tractor tires were sold at Ashland Oil.

Ashland Oil is presently managed by Jeff Podzemny. Shirley Brandenburg is the bookkeeper, Mike Millam is bulk truck driver, and Robert Lee Moore is the service attendant. Brian Steele is hired as part time service attendant.

Board members are: Kenneth Dome, President; Tom Betschart, Vice-President; Mike Harden, Secretary and Treasurer, and other board members are Larry Park and Gilbert Krier.

In 1963 Ray Crosby established an auto parts store on Highway 160 selling parts both retail and wholesale. He named his store Ashland Auto Supply. Ray's store was the second Big A store in Kansas with the Big A warehouse in Great Bend, Kansas. Now there are 60 Big A Stores in Kansas.

In 1966, Bill R. Anderson purchased the Ashland Auto Supply and moved the water well service from the country to Ashland to be part of the store. The store was then known as Ashland Auto Supply and Well Service.

ASHLAND SWIMMING POOL


Ashland's first swimming pool was built in 1916, south of Block 12 and east of Cedar Street. Michael and Nancy Lemmon built it. It was approximately 100 feet long and 35 feet wide. The office and dressing rooms were at the north end. Mr. and Mrs. Lemmon managed the pool until his death in 1922. A family by the name of Blaylock managed it a while, then the Earl Jarrell family leased it. In March of 1936, the Orville Dickey family leased it and managed it until Ashland built its first Municipal Pool in the park in 1947. All that remains of the old pool are memories in the minds of grandparents of today who were the children of that era.

ASHLAND CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

The Clark County Chamber of Commerce and the Commercial Club were the fore-runners of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce. We know that it was in existence before 1923, but the earliest records in the Chamber of Commerce office date from a re-organization which took place from 1938 to 1940.

The purpose, as stated in the Constitution and By-laws, was "to promote a greater co-operation among the various sections and interests of Clark County and, by a united effort, endeavor to solve the problems and meet the needs of the various sections and interests and to promote the best interests and general welfare of the county and its citizens. This organization shall be non-political and non-sectional."

Officers in 1938 were: E.A. (Chet) Stevenson, president; Elmer Walker, vice-president; M.C. Nelson, secretary-treasurer.

Directors were: H.A. Morain, Appleton Township; Wes. Blazer, Brown Township; W.C. Ray, Center Township; John York, Cimarron Township; I.J. Klinger, Edwards Township; Hugh McIntyre, Englewood Township; J.C. Vallentine, Lexington Township; Lyle Mayfield, Liberty Township; Vernon McMinimy, Sitka Township; C.R. Smith, Vesta Township. A motion was made February 13, 1938 at the organizational meeting that the Constitution be amended to read, "The annual dues will be fifty cents rather than a dollar."

In 1940, the president was R.L. Crosby, vice-president was R.E. King, and secretary-treasurer was C.E. Zimmerman, with the board of directors the same as above.

THE CITIZENS STATE BANK

The first meeting for the organization of the Citizens State Bank was held January 26, 1906, in Englewood, Kansas, with the following present: C.D. Perry, W.P. Fulkerson, C.M. Sawyer, J.H. Clay, Cecil W. Newby, A.V. Smith and W. C. Smith. The Charter was granted February 8, 1906, and the bank opened for business.

W.A. Lonker purchased controlling interest in the bank in 1915. He served as Cashier and Director until 1930. At this time he was elected Vice-President and Managing Officer. In 1942, he was elected President and served in this office until his death in 1957.

The bank was located at 112 W. 8th in the building pictured. Plans were made in 1928 to build a new building at 722 Main. On December 1, 1929, the bank was moved to the new modern building, the same which it occupies today. In 1964, the interior of the building was extensively remodeled.

The following have served as presidents: C.D. Perry, 1906; W.P. Fulkerson, 1906-1910; R.N. Molyneux, 1910-1942; W.A. Lonker, 1942-1957; George E. Broadie, 1957-1981 and Mary Louise Broadie, 1981 to present.

THE CLARK COUNTY CLIPPER

Like Ashland itself, the *Clark County Clipper* is also marking its Centennial year in 1984. The newspaper actually predates the establishment of the Ashland community, the first several issues being published in Clark City before Ashland was organized.

On September 25, 1884, two Clark County settlers, Marquis and Church, one a surveyor and the other a real estate agent, saw the need for a newspaper in a growing community and established the *Clark County Clipper* at Clark City. The paper sold for a nickle a copy, and the two owners, whose total investment in type, press and paper was about \$300, were major advertisers in their publication.

Commenting on the birth of the newspaper in 1884, the Kansas Cowboy printed an item as follows: "Marquis and Church have just started a paper at Clark City, Kansas, called the Clark County Clipper. The Clipper is a wide-awake, newsy paper, and promises to be a necessity and a success."

The first *Clipper* published in Ashland, when Clark City merged with the new town, was on November 6, 1884. Two weeks later Marquis went back to the land business full time and Church was the sole "proprietor."

Among the advertisements in an early *Clipper* was one for "Beard Elixer"--guaranteed to force luxurious mustaches, whiskers or hair on bald heads in 20-30 days. (The present *Clipper* publisher would find great benefit in such a product.)

There have been only 13 changes of editors during the 100 years the *Clipper* has served the residents of Clark County. Some of them didn't last too long, averaging about 3½ years each (one for only two months), until the late Walter Ray purchased the paper in 1921. One of the early editors who stayed longer than many others was H.C. Mayse, who published the newspaper from 1885 to 1917.

Walter Ray and later his son, Harold Ray, were in charge of the *Clipper* for 50 years of its existence, from 1921 to 1971. Ron and Lois Morrison became the owners in July of 1971. They have continued to publish the *Clipper* since that time along with the *Minneola Record*, the only other Clark County newspaper, which they acquired in 1973.

During the past 13 years, the Morrisons have updated the plant with new equipment and converted the newspaper printing process from letterpress to offset.

The major emphasis of the *Clark County Clipper* today is on local news and service to its readers and advertisers, a centurylong tradition in which the owners and employees take great pride.

Concrete Mix, Inc. came to Ashland March 1, 1980 to help build the new swimming pool. CULVER CHEVROLET-OLDSMOBILE

The first Chevrolet garage in Ashland was Brown and Harvey owned by Virgil Brown and George Harvey who had their business in what is now the Hardesty House. They began this business sometime after 1918.

W.A. (Bill) Willard purchased the Chevrolet agency from Brown and Harvey and had an ad in the *Clark County Clipper* announcing the purchase on September 27, 1928. In March, 1929, he moved to the present location at 120 E. 8th Street. An article in the *Clark County Clipper* March 14, 1929 states "that a modern fire proof garage with adequate facilities for various departments of the business was recently built by Mr. Willard." The building measures 120 x 50 feet and is of brick. The display room measures 30 x 50 feet. Bill Willard continued in business until his death in 1950.

Wayne Smith, his son-in-law, continued the business as Willard Chevrolet. Wayne sold it to Elvin Graham, who operated as Graham Chevrolet and Oldsmobile and in turn sold the business to Ron Culver in 1967 and it is now known as Culver Chevrolet and Oldsmobile.

Mrs. Willard died March 10, 1984 and the building is now owned by her daughter, Phyllis Smith.

DICKEY FLORAL

The floral and greenhouse business had a humble beginning in Ashland. Mrs. Mabel Wallingford built a small greenhouse using it as a hobby. This was in 1934. People kept wanting to buy flowers from her, so she expanded and went into the floral business in earnest. Mrs. Lucile A. Fisher, sister of Francis Arnold, who was born in Ashland, often came to visit her family and she and Mrs. Wallingford were good friends. Lucile was a successful florist in New York City so a trading of ideas took place. Mrs. Wallingford had her greenhouse and in the summer had a flower garden so she grew a big share of the flowers she used. Her work shop was in her basement. Mrs. Wallingford was also a registered nurse. When she had relatives whose health began to fail, she was called to nurse them and she had to neglect the floral business, so, in 1942, she sold her greenhouse and business to Orville and Myrtle Dickey.

The Dickeys moved the greenhouse to 1216 Cedar. Orville and Myrtle managed it until Myrtle died in December, 1962.

March 17, 1972, Orville Dickey and Lorraine Bassnett were married in the Baptist Indian Mission, Canton, Oklahoma. Since then, there has been a continual expansion of the Floral Shop.

THE HOME OF FIRESTONE

FELLERS MOTOR COMPANY

Ford products have been sold at 812 Main in Ashland for seventy years. George McNickle started the Ford Agency in 1914, selling Model T's. He successfully continued in this business for 35 years.

Jack Fellers and Art Wurth purchased the business from Mr. McNickle in 1949. The new owners called the business Fellers Motor Company. The following men continued as employees: De Nelson Lynch, Pop McIntyre and Junior Wise.

Mr. Wurth soon sold his share of the business to Jack and Pauline Fellers. They continued making it a family affair. Pauline did the bookkeeping while sons Bob and Tom helped as they could. Pauline worked with Jack until her death in 1967. Robert Fellers joined his father in business on a full time basis in 1958.

The building was remodeled in the early 1960's to improve offices, show room, parts and shop areas. The purchase of the lots north to 8th Street provides a spacious car lot.



Melvin Kennedy and Bob Harmon were employed in the early 1960's and have been with the business some twenty years. Jack Fellers began a semi-retirement after thirty years in 1979.

GAMBLES

The Gambles Store was first opened in Ashland by Floyd and Georgia Palmer in June of 1935. The Palmers ran the store in the building now occupied by Losson Pike's law office until 1953, when they moved to Main Street into a building formerly occupied by the Burton Cafe. In 1965, Cleo and Bessie Bliss purchased the Gamble business from the Palmers. Cleo and Bessie later purchased the Gamble Store in Coldwater and ran

both until they sold the Ashland business to Al and Theda Seidel in 1973. Dave and Myrna Heath and Al and Theda were in the store until 1980. In 1981, Al's Service-Gambles became Seidel-Heath Inc. DBA Gambles and is now owned and operated by Dave and Myrna Heath.

MEN'S CLOTHING STORES

So far as can be ascertained there was no such thing as a "Men's Clothing Store" in Ashland in its formative years. It is probable that such merchandise was available at "General Stores" or "Mercantiles." Women's apparel could be bought from several local millinery and dress making shops.

The Ashland Journal of May 20, 1887, mentions that there were four "Dry Goods-Clothing" stores located here, viz: E.S. Miner & Co., Brooks Bros., Berry Bros., and Dillon & Co. All were located on Main Street so far as can be determined.

In 1905, J.C. Smith rented his building on Lot 10, Block 32 (north side of present Milligan Drug) to Frank and Alvin Mull who established a men's clothing store. The business was continued by Frank until 1913 when B.T. Broadie acquired the stock. He remained at this location until 1933 when the building (along with others adjacent) was completely destroyed by the "fire." Immediately following the fire, Mr. Broadie bought new fixtures and moved one door north into a new building owned by J.W. Berryman (Lot 9). The stock was sold to F.J. Blum in

1936. Earl Haelsig assumed ownership on or around 1942 and sold it to Edwin and Alice Metzger in 1959. Wendell Haley took over in 1966 and was followed by Warren Branson of Coldwater, then Verle Akers who closed out the stock in the early part of 1974.



HARDESTY HOUSE HOTEL

In July, 1885, the Ashland Town Company sold lots 7 and 8, Block 39 in Original Ashland to Samuel H. Cummings, etux. Frank M. Arnold and C.W. Carson acquired Lot 7 in October 1886 from Cummings and Lot 8 in March, 1887 from Ethelbert Taylor.

In June, 1909, Carson sold his interest to F.M. Arnold. In September, 1909, a brick building was erected with "party walls in conformity with agreements" on these lots. This agreement was between F.M. Arnold and E.O. Palmer and between F.M. Arnold and H.C. Mayse.

Bert and Katie Hodson purchased the property from F.M. Arnold in February, 1920. In November, 1927, the Hodsons announced plans to build a hotel and dining room (adding a brick second story). They sponsored a contest to name the hotel. Virgil Brown and George Harvey opened a garage on the premises at the time. "Hodson Hotel" was the winning name, and by April 1, fifteen of the rooms were open to the public. Katie Hodson died in March, 1946.

For many years a barber shop and shoe shine stand were in the south side. In February, 1949, Bert and Rose Hodson sold the hotel to James E. and Marie Cogley. In November, 1969, Marie (Cogley) Eskew and Glenn Eskew sold the property to Jack and Betty Hardesty of Ashland who are present owners with Jack's mother, Edith (Roberts) Hardesty, as manager in residence.

The hotel is listed in Country Inns, Lodges and Historic Hotels of the Midwest and Rocky Mountain States.

Carl talked with the customers while cooking anything they wanted, at any time of the day. Carrie Roberts always wanted a bacon and tomato sandwich which Carl delivered, saying, "Here you are, and I hope you choke." Pearl sold pie to more folks than wanted it, just for fun and profit. A line formed every Saturday night, as the place was small and the food tasty.

They ran the cafe for several years, leaving to take over the Callison Cafe in the West Bowl, Wichita, Kansas.

they decided they wanted to plant shade trees on both sides of the road going to the cemetery. Mr. and Mrs. C.B. Vandeveer heard of their wants and donated small trees enough to do this. After Katie passed away, Edna and Effie never called another meeting. They had a small amount of money in the treasury and they gave half to the City and with the other half, they bought the "white cross" on the north side of the Catholic Cemetery in "Loving Memory of Katherine A. Hensley."

Dora Perry McFarland helped in the store for many years. She and Katie made many a beautiful hat for brides (Edna Cox, who is still living, was one of the brides they made a hat for) and any special occasion you might need a hat for. Hazel Welden, Ruth Clark Mull, Kathryn Vandeveer Hensley, Mary Kay Yunker Bailey, Barbara Ann and Eleanor Hensley were others who worked in the store.

Grace Randall Smith and Katie made a tour around the United States and attended the World's Fair in Chicago. They were gone a month. Kathryn Hensley and daughters took care of the store in her absence. Barbara and Eleanor enjoyed going to market with Katie in Kansas City, Mo., and Oklahoma City.

In 1925, Katie built the new building which she so enjoyed for 29 years until August 5, 1954, when she passed away. A few years later the building was sold to Don Milligan.

Katie loved the business life and each person who visited in the store or bought merchandise from her. She made her home with her brother, Paul, and wife, Kathryn, and family, which was a pleasure to all.

If anyone loved their parents, brothers, sisters and other relatives and friends, which were many, it was Katherine A. Hensley.

In the May 11, 1905, issue of the Clark County Clipper the following news item was found on page 3: "A number of citizens in Ashland and the surrounding country met Saturday and organized the Home Lumber and Supply Company. Capital stock was \$10,000, divided into 1000 shares of \$10 each. Mr. J.W. Berryman was chosen President; B.D. Messing, Vice President; E.A. Shattuck, Treasurer and H.C. Mayse, Secretary . . . This is a good company and prospects for success are splendid." It's possible that skeptics of the day might have discounted such editorial optimism by pointing out that the editor of the newspaper was also secretary of the newly-formed corporation!

From the original yard at Ashland, the corporation has grown to include 18 yards: Protection, Coldwater, Meade, Plains, Dighton, Emporia, Eureka, ElDorado, Medicine Lodge, Anthony, Caldwell, Lyons, Sterling, Nickerson and Ellinwood, Kansas; Buffalo and Laverne, Oklahoma. While the number of yards has been multiplied by 18 the amount of capital has multipled over 300 times.

Mr. Berryman was president from 1905-1940; T.R. Cauthers, 1940-1953; Jerome C. Berryman, 1953-1960; R.V. "Tex" Shrewder, 1960-1975 and F.M. "Mike" Humphreys has served since 1975. Besides Shrewder and Humphreys, the present Board of Directors consists of Mrs. James W. (Eloise) Berryman, Thomas Berryman, Scott Glen, Floyd "Bus" Couch, Hugh Stevenson and

Tom Fellers. Louise Cauthers Berryman, a director for 24 years, resigned this year.

While most of the employees in the office have been men, it would be an oversight to omit recognition of two women book-keepers, who by their skill and loyalty, have made significant contributions to the success of the company. Miss Essie Haver served from 1919 to 1953 and Mrs. Mary Preisner Urban has served since

1957.

The company is one of the largest lumber concerns in the state and has maintained its general offices here since its founding. Present employees in the office besides Humphreys, Couch and Urban include Paul M. Baker (since 1959), John Humphreys and Dawn Rolf Carter.

THE HOME LUMBER AND SUPPLY COMPANY Yard

While we are one of the oldest businesses in Ashland, we are aware that several lumber yards had come and gone before us. The earliest lumber yard in Ashland was Bullen & Averill established in 1884. The site was the present location of the Ashland Cleaners (Lots 1-4, Blk. 34) on South Main. The Clark County Clipper reported that they received an average of 20 (wagon) loads of lumber per day. Not only was the yard bustling with unbelievable sales activity but it is reputed to be the site of the first hanging in town. The victim, an alleged assassin, was a cowboy by the name of Joe Mitchell. Mike Sughrue, the undersheriff, was so outraged with this act of lawlessness that he threatened to resign. The Ashland townspeople regretted and repented; the cowboys stayed home on week-ends; Martin's Saloon (up by Clark City) closed forever and "Mike" reconsidered and stayed on as a premier law-enforcement official until his death in 1901.

Besides the Bullen-Averill yard there were at least eight other yards which had come and gone prior to the opening of the Home yard in 1905, viz; Weeks Bros., Chicago Lumber, Rock Island Lumber, Oertmeyer, A.C. Houston, J.H. Clay, Big Jo and Ashland Lumber.

The Home Lumber yard started business on May 5, 1905. The first manager was Mr. Addison Baker (later to serve as probate judge for the county for many years) who was hired for \$50 per month. Mr. Baker stayed only a few months as did his replacement, Mr. T.H. Temple. Next came "Long Charlie" Gilchrist who left in 1910. Loren M. "Jack" Johnson, a local boy, then took over the management duties and continued 36 years until his death in 1946. Following "Jack" came his son, Ted, then Charles Guyer, Don Walker, Paul Baker, Lee Snell and Bob Hoffman. Bryan Crick has been manager since 1981, assisted by Aaron Bates.





RED CLIFFE DAIRY

To support farming income, Paul and Estella Salver started the Red Cliffe Dairy in 1935 and supplied milk to the CCC camp constructing Clark County State Lake Dam. They strived to keep from 40 to 42 heavy milking cows in production at all times. Army trucks picked up the milk and orange juice daily, but town customer delivery was available by way of a Model A Panel Wagon embellished by Ike Osborn's maternal grandad with "Red Cliffe Dairy." Approximately two years later, the dairy relinquished the CCC contract. About 1939 the dairy herd was disbursed with the condition that the Salyers purchase the milk from three of the farmer-purchasers and the dairy continued until about 1942. It was then that the dairy and all except three or four cows were sold. Milking and processing required many man hours of work (4:00 AM - 10:00 PM)! Cecil Rankin (first employee) was married and living in his own home. However, complete room and board were furnished Red Landers, Ike Osborn, Slim Black and John Osborn in the Salver 5-room home. All of the activities of these six years (my age span covered 7 through 13) included additional farm employees, such as John Osborn (who became as close to me as any brother),

Bill Dome, and Raymond Bloxsom. Household help included Helen Martin of Protection and several other girls, Alice and Laura, whose last names I can no longer remember. It has been exciting to me to recall those years of very hard work and stress spiced with the adventure of youth.

HISTORY OF CURTIS S. SLATON, PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT (Management Service Bureau 1959-1973)

Dean E. Matthews and C.R. Lowry formed a partnership for the purpose of keeping records on a custom basis. The firm was known as Management Service Bureau and was managed by C.R. Lowry from an office in the Matthews Agency, 114 West Eighth Avenue.

T.T. SMITH GENERAL MERCHANDISE STORE

My father, T.T. Smith, came to Ashland in 1906 and took charge of the C.W. Carson Department Store. When that business changed hands, he and George Taylor bought the B.L. Stephens Store, located in the third building from the *Clipper* office, now known as The Big Blue. They operated this business for several years as Taylor and Smith.

He bought George Taylor's interest and continued the business as T.T. Smith General Merchandise Store, selling groceries and

dry goods. This business served a large trade area and many people came from Oklahoma to purchase supplies. He was a very generous man and extended credit knowing that some would not be able to pay. The store hours were long, many businesses stayed open until late at night, particularly on Saturday night.

My mother, Effie, worked in the store with him and was also the bookkeeper. In winter time people would gather around the old pot bellied stove and visit. Cal Fox, another pioneer, worked for him many years. He did the delivering of merchandise to people twice a day, with a team and wagon and later a Model T. In 1930, they disposed of the store. DON SPOTTS LUMBER CO.

Don Spotts worked for the Panhandle Lumber Co. in Texas and New Mexico for three years. He moved to Wellington, Kansas, where he served as manager of the Amsden Lbr. Co. until May, 1947, when he returned to Ashland, his home town, to build the Don Spotts Lbr. Co. The rough work of the buildings was done by Don and a crew of workmen who came to Ashland looking for work. The interior finishing was done by local construction crews.

The yard was opened for business by Don and Ben Ellis. In 1951, Richard and Betty Arnspiger arrived. After several years involvement serving in the Kansas Legislature, Don and Carol sold the business to Rich and Betty in 1972.

Don Spotts Lumber, as it continues to be called, manages to survive with the support of many customers, friends and contractors. Among the people who have served on the payroll are Frank Haley, Bill Gibson, Tom Betschart, Renae Osborn, Mick Reynolds, Robert Bond, Debbie and Doug Inderlied, Joe and Jan Fast, and Jim Arnspiger. We are grateful to all who have



shared in helping to maintain and improve the Ashland and Clark County area community.

All this was made possible through financial aid originally granted by W.A. Lonker, the late president of the Citizens State Bank.

The company is located at 916 Main, the site of a former livery stable and creamery.

THE STOCKGROWERS STATE BANK

The Clark County Bank opened for business June 23, 1885, at the corner of Eighth Avenue and Main Street, as a private bank under the ownership of George Theis, Jr., with a paid-in capital of \$4,000. It was the first bank in the county.

In May of 1887, the First National Bank of Ashland was organized by James A. Blair, of Blair & Company, bankers of New York, and Oliver E. Ewart, of Medicine Lodge, Kansas. An agreement was reached with Mr. Theis which resulted in a merger between the two banks. Mr. Theis became Cashier of the new First National Bank.

, It soon became apparent that a new bank building was necessary because of rapid growth. A group of business men, including A.J. Kinnear, J.C. Smith, C.P. Woodbury, the Berry brothers and O.P. Cooper, combined with the bank owners to develop plans for a solid block of brick buildings, two and three stories high, to house an opera house, the city offices, a bank and other retail and office space. On May 19, 1887, the Clark County Clipper carried an announcement that a contract for the construction of the present bank building was awarded to W.A. Ritchie, Winfield. The building was designed to dominate the main intersection of the town. The bank building is a two-story Romanesque style structure of reddish-orange faced soft clay brick. A semi-circular pediment on the south bears the legend "A.J. Kinnear 1887" and another pediment over the corner entrance is inscribed with "First National Bank 1887." The architect was F.A. Weston of Colorado.

The new bank prospered until the drought of 1889, and was reorganized in April of 1891, as a state bank because capitalization had fallen below the allowable minimum for a national bank. George Theis was the principal stockholder and the name was changed to The Farmers and Stockgrowers Bank of Ashland. Mr. Theis operated the bank until 1899, when he sold it to C.Q. Chandler and J.W. Berryman. In 1900, the bank was rechartered

as The Stockgrowers National Bank and became a member of a chain operated by the National Bank of Commerce of Kansas City. Mr. Berryman purchased the other interests and assumed complete control in 1907.

In 1933, the national charter was relinquished once more, and the bank was reorganized under a state charter and given the name which it bears today, The Stockgrowers State Bank.

The bank was under the direct management and ownership of J.W. Berryman from 1901 until his death in 1940. James W. Berryman succeeded his father as president in 1935 and retained the office until his death May 12, 1974. Thomas L. Brower was president until February, 1981, at which time John T. Fellers, present president, assumed the office.

Total assets have grown from \$4,480 on June 23, 1885 to \$28,529,000 on December 31, 1983. Deposits and loans have shown a corresponding increase. Officers are: John T. Fellers,

President; W. Frank York, Vice-president; G. Noel Park, Vice-president; N. Christine Blue, Cashier. Other employees are: Ellen Harrington, Carol Nicholson, Marva Ellis, Ruby Zuehlke, Virginia Betschart, Mary Pike and Wayne Nusz.

For 99 years the bank has continued to promote the growth and well-being of its customers and the community by providing financial services. Remodeling of the bank interior and exterior was done in 1958, and again in 1976. Continual effort has been made to maintain the historical significance of the bank building. It was entered on the National Register of Historic Places on April 26, 1972. Plans for a new building for the bank were announced in April of 1984, in the hope that a new structure could be completed in 1985, the Stockgrowers State Bank's centennial year.

CHARLES E. STROUSE - JEWELER

My wife and I and two boys, Bill and Monte, came to Ashland in June, 1936 for the Olson Drilling Company. In 1937, we finished the second oil well on the Morrison Ranch 15 miles northeast of Ashland. Work in the oil field shut down, so to help pay expenses, I set up a watch maker's bench in Fred Bloom's clothing store. In a few months our drilling started up and I went back to the oil field. In 1938, we were shut down so I set up my work bench with George Pike in the building just north of the Citizens Bank. While I was there I bought our home just north of the court house.

In 1940, we went to Michigan with the First Rotary Rig to drill in a Glacer Drift Cable Tools. Took one year to complete a 36 hundred foot well. We finished our first well in 20 days, from then on it was all rotary.

We came back to Kansas (1941) and worked here until 1945 when I left the oil field for good and opened a jewelry store in the Floyd Blakeley Building on South Main. I now own these buildings. In 1950, Mr. Humphreys asked me if I would drive a school bus. I did not think I could take that much time away from the store so he asked me if I would drive until he could get a driver to take my place. Twenty-four years later, with my wife's help in the store, I was still driving the bus.

I took up flying in 1945. Walter Ashcraft and I bought a plane and built the first aircraft hanger at the new Ashland Airport. Two years later, we sold the plane and hanger. Wilbur Harmon, George Pike, Bob Webb, Paul Fox and I formed the J3 Flying Club. We built the Rock Hanger which is still on the airport. We bought a J3 Cub Plane, 3 years later wrecked the Cub and bought an Air Coupe Plane. George Pike and I bought the other members in the club out. Ten years later we sold the plane and hanger ending the J3 Flying Club.

My wife died in 1975 and to keep myself occupied, I started building Grandfather Clocks and from 1978 to 1983 I made 51 clocks. I still have my jewelry store but am more or less retired. I am also Bus Supervisor for the School District. In 1978 the Ashland Golf Club built a new golf course and I spent about three years helping to get it ready to play on, now I spend a lot of time playing golf. In 48 years of living in Ashland, I've increased my family with another boy and girl and five English bulldogs.

J.M. VALLENTINE SLAUGHTER HOUSE

J.M. Vallentine owned and operated a slaughter house and feed yard in conjunction with the Meat Market. This business was located on both sides of Bluff Creek, east of Ashland (Block 50, Lots 6-16) toward the south end of the later location of the city park. The *Clipper* (March 5, 1908) reported that J.M. Vallentine's Slaughter House was thought to be the best equipped in southwest Kansas. Many livestock produced on the farm in Lexington, then operated by his son, Cloyd, were brought to the

Ashland slaughter house and meat market. The volume of business generated was large, and it required that livestock be purchased from many other farms and ranches in the Ashland vicinity for slaughter. When the equipment from the meat market and possibly parts of the slaughter house were sold in 1922, it required seven large trucks to move the facilities to Liberal.

VALLENTINE & SON MEAT MARKET

Before coming to Clark County, Major operated a butcher shop in Emporia. During 1886-1902, he slaughtered livestock on

his farm in the Lexington community for family use, neighbors and local retail sales. In 1902, he purchased the J.H. Turvey

butcher shop in Ashland and re-opened as the City Meat Market.

This first meat market was located on the east side of Main Street south of the lot later housing the telephone office. Behind the building was an ice house dug into the ground and the residence house. An advertisement in the *Clipper* (Dec. 11, 1902 issue) announced the following: "dressed poultry on Saturday, fresh pork sausage, Tuesday, Mutton on Thursday, fish and oysters, Friday, also, salt and cured meats, fresh beef and homemade lard any time at the City Meat Market."

Major's second meat market was located in the brick building on the west side of Main Street which he bought in 1903. This building now houses the *Clipper* office. Here Major developed a complete meat market equipped with mechanical refrigeration and operated with his son, Guy, and later, his son, Roy, as J.M. Vallentine & Son. Behind the store building in 1906, was erected a cement stone ice house, from which residents of Ashland were furnished ice.

For several years, a Mexican restaurant was located in the basement of the meat market. He sold hamburgers for 5 cents, chili, 10 cents and hot tamales, 10 cents.

Major continued to operate the meat market until his retirement in 1918, and sold the building to the AF & AM Lodge the following year.




WALKERS OF ASHLAND

YOUNG CONSTRUCTION CO.

In 1965, Jerry traded a 1954 Oldsmobile car for a 1948 flat bed truck to start hauling dirt. In early 1966, Jerry and Kay Young bought Cleo Bliss' backhoe and trencher, and started their own business. In 1968, Jerry did some work for Troy Mahoney north of Ashland where there were oil wells. They needed a pumper at the time so Jerry started pumping their wells. We had our office in our home until 1976 when we moved it south of Schweitzer Barber Shop on Main Street. In April, 1979, we

bought Schweitzer Barber Shop on the highway and made an office.

In 1981, we bought the old Dairy Plaza and made a shop out of it because it was next door to the office.

In 1982, we incorporated the business. We do just oilfield work now and employ two pumpers and usually three roustabout men.

ZIMMERMAN HARDWARE

Chester Lee Zimmerman and family moved from a farm 6 miles northwest of Ashland into town in 1923, at which time he

took employment in the hardware store owned by Mr. Eyman Phebus. In 1928, he and his brother Arthur formed a partnership

and purchased the store from Mr. Phebus and operated the store under the name of "Zimmerman Hardware." In the mid 1930's the partnership was dissolved. Arthur was a skilled music technician, specialized in the tuning and rebuilding of pianos. Chester continued to operate the store.

I remember in the dirty thirties, it was my job to dust and try to keep things clean--which was a total impossibility.

Dad would advertise in the *Clark County Clipper*, under the topic "Keg-O-Nails." He continued in business until 1948 and sold the store to Farris Brockman. This deal did not work out. In the early 1950's, he sold the store to Al Seidel and continued working in the store until 1973. After his retirement from active work he serviced and repaired small appliances at his home.

ACRES

Acres is located on the angle road midway between Ashland and Englewood.

The Swayze ranch was where Manning, Kansas was started on the Santa Fe railroad siding. About two years later the name was changed to Acres, when it was discovered that Kansas had another Manning. The Post Office was established in 1890.

Acres had a freight train to move cattle, grain, feed and coal, and a passenger train to carry people, groceries, and mail. Acres consisted of a depot, stockyard, blacksmith shop, hotel, lumber

yard, store, post office and two elevators as well as two houses.

The population in 1930 was around 30 people. The Clark County WPA built outdoor toilets at Acres and helped land-owners plant shelter belt trees.

David Lunsford was the last postmaster and depot agent, and he closed out the grocery store in Acres. He also managed one or both of the elevators.

ENGLEWOOD

In 1884 Colonel C.D. Perry founded and named this town after his home town, Englewood, Illinois. The first officers were N.E. Osborn, President; B.B. Bush, Secretary; and Grant Hatfield, Treasurer. The business houses were on Douglas Avenue, from Cattle King Hotel three blocks west on Main to Saint Elmo Hotel three blocks east. Residences were scattered from the north hills to the Five Mile Creek on the south and from the Frank Cox Ranch west to the R.V. Harden place east.

Day Creek Valley east of Ashland was settled in 1884-1885 and named "Sitka" in January, 1886, by an early pioneer, R.B. Pratt, who felt the weather was much like his previous home, Sitka, Alaska. The first wood frame building was the Sitka House built in 1886.

The first rural school district in the county was formed at Sitka and the one-room building was opened March 1, 1886 with 16 pupils.

In 1907 Englewood moved south of Five Mile Creek. This change was due to a money making scheme and inability to secure good titles to the lots in Old Town. New Town consisted of three churches, school, doctors, lawyers, three hotels, refreshment parlors, pool halls, blacksmith shop, lumber yards, meat market, photographer, barber shop, newspaper, mercantile stores, hardware stores, jeweler, flour mill, concrete block factory, soft brick kiln, livery barns, feed yards, laundry, elevator and other industrial enterprises.

The present school house was finished in 1965. Business houses were almost depleted. The school and Methodist Church were transferred to Ashland in 1970. One hundred years later the town consists of two churches, two elevators, post office, filling station, beauty shop, tavern, swimming pool, produce company, port of entry, two social clubs, mechanic shop, fire department, and a cafe serving one hundred people, ten at a time. Mayor Robin Roberts and the city council members Barbara Lind, Bob Graves, Eugene Woodruff, R.V. Sutherland and John Butts are the present governing body.

SITKA

The C. K. & W. railroad tracks were laid through Sitka in 1887 and the town became a major supply point for the area from Oklahoma on the south to Lexington community on the north.

In 1906-1907 George Harvey bought the Sitka townsite and had it platted. Harvey and Wallingford offered 1019 lots for sale for \$25 each on March 30, 1909.

In 1914, a 2-room public school was built in east Sitka; the school district was reorganized in 1921 and Sitka became one of

the first consolidated school districts in the state. There were 79 students in grades 1-8 in 1924. The St. Mary's Catholic Church had a parochial school from 1921 until 1932.

The Methodist Church was built in 1912 and dedicated January 5, 1913. The St. Mary's Catholic Church was dedicated in 1917.

From 1915 through 1920 the town also had a depot, two livery barns, several grocery stores, two hotels, two lumber yards, a blacksmith shop, bank, restaurant, barbershop and drug store. The population of Sitka increased to over 200 people.

The railroad built through Buffalo, Oklahoma, in 1921, and improved automobile travel, combined with the effects of the Dirty Thirties helped to make Sitka no longer necessary. The school closed in 1949, the Methodist Church in 1953 and the Catholic Church in 1957. The bank merged with one in Ashland and other businesses closed one by one. The last passenger train made its run April 5, 1959, and the depot closed in 1961. The post office was officially closed May 22, 1964.

In 1984 remaining are 2 grain elevators, a restaurant in the school house, an oil field supply business, two abandoned churches and 4 houses.

THE SITKA HOUSE

The first two-story frame building in Sitka was built by Mr. Tinsman in 1884 (the lumber freighted from Dodge City). It was used as a hotel for travelers and cowboys who drove cattle to the

Dodge City market over the Fort Supply-Fort Dodge Trail. Families who lived in it were Tinsman, Foster, Bob Edgar and Ed McCasland. After the death of McCasland in 1890 the house was vacant, open to any one who wished to stop over night or to live there. Then it became known as the "Haunted House" until Fred Kumberg bought it in 1912. It was discovered the footsteps one heard in the hall upstairs and the three steps down at four o'clock every morning and afternoon were caused by vibrations when the train passed over a certain place east of Sitka. We learned later that there are caves under Sitka because it is in a direct line between the Big Basin and the Salt Beds in Oklahoma. The Salt Beds were formed when the salt was washed out of the caverns under the Big Basin causing that ground to sink.

Eastern Kansas was too confining, so the family sold their farm and moved to Clark County in September, 1898. The headquarters was located four or five miles northwest of Ashland beside the Fort Supply Trail, and was established by Henry Faris, a Texas cattleman in 1878, long before the organization of Clark County. Faris built the main ranch house which he called "The Hacienda," the corrals and barn all with native stone. These improvements were kept in perfect repair by the Abells, just as they were when finished in 1878. In 1914, Mr. Abell married Anna Helen Brooks, a former companion of Mrs. Alice Abell. She survived him.

Apparently, the Daniel D. Babione family arrived near the same time as the Newt Aldridge farmily, because he and Eliza Jane Babione were married March 8, 1887 which was only one year and ten months after Newt filed his claim.

The Daniel Babiones filed on a claim which is known as the Babione Springs and never known to go dry.

Jasper Newton hauled freight from Kinsley into Indian Terri-

tory for several years and traded with the Indians and acquired several quarters of land during this time.

My grandmother, Eliza Jane, also filed a claim. Newt died on May 24, 1924, at which time he owned 2,000 acres in Lexington Township and 640 acres in Sitka Township. He owned three large dwellings with large horse barns in the City of Ashland. He owned an irrigated tract in the Rio Grande Valley of Texas and several lots in Wichita. We lost the land in the valley during the depression of the 1930's due to delinquent taxes and irrigated water rights. I have my grandmother's, Eliza Jane's, family Bible and personal records as far back as when they came to Kansas. Eliza Jane died on August 20, 1954 at the age of 87 and is buried at Highland Cemetery.

was taken (160 acres per man). Then came the drouth years, nothing raised, no possible means of livelihood. Most of the settlers left, leaving their land for mortgage companies and tax titles. Great portions of this were bought up by cattlemen at very reduced prices." A *Clipper* headline, June 21, 1888: "Arnold & Carson Have \$100,000 to Loan on Clark Co. Land, Also a Large List of Choice Farms, City Lots and Stock Ranches to Sell, at a bargain . . ."

Frank became a rancher in 1893, when he established the "Arnold Ranch" which is managed today by his grandson, Philip Arnold.

Frank and Ifie May Espey (born February 17, 1870, in Bushnell, Illinois) were married June 17, 1888, at the home of her father, George W. Espey, Ashland druggist. She was a graduate of the Pattersonville Educational Institute of Hull, Iowa in 1887. In 1904, the Arnolds moved to Nevada, Missouri, returning to Ashland in 1906 at which time they built the house on the southwest corner of 8th & Maple. In 1913, Frank, Ifie and children, Lucile, Francis, Marion and Iras, moved to Emporia, where he chartered the Commercial National Bank & Trust Co. He served as president and was Chairman of the Board during its sale and liquidation in 1943. He was president and a charter member of the Kansas Livestock Association. Ifie was a charter member of the Ashland Study Club.

Ifie died in 1945, and Frank in 1949. Both are buried in Highland Cemetery.

Addison Baker, son of Benjamin Franklin and Lucy White Baker, was born on December 23, 1848.


Anna Delilah, daughter of William and Ann Carter Holiday, was born February 6, 1854.

During the latter seige, when drifts were high and supplies were low, they ran out of meat. It was then that Charlie trapped twenty sparrows and "Ma" created a tasty sparrow pie!

The family moved to Ashland for educational advantages. At age sixteen, Mattie began teaching school in the county for \$28.00 a month. After teaching ten years in the county and Ashland schools, she was elected Superintendent of Schools for Clark County. In 1903, during her second term in office, she was united in marriage to George W. Baker.

He lived out his life in the Ashland vicinity as a carpenter. He was a devoted elder of the Ashland Christian Church as far back as his children can remember and until his death in 1945. own operation. We have expanded it to include the south half of the Harper Ranch in Clark and Comanche Counties and later the most part of Sitka, east of the Highway, for a residence.

At one time we were running about 2,250 cows using 125 bulls. Up until about 1953, I had ridden a horse more miles than I had traveled in an automobile.

Most of their possessions were two quarter sections of land, a two room semi-sod house, a good well, three horses, a wagon, bull dog, milk cow, pig, and the essential tools and equipment for keeping house and farming.

In 1891 a little frame house was added. About 1897 there was a much larger addition with porches. An orchard and garden were essential parts of the improved place. These provided part of the food along with dairy products and home-made bread. Nothing was wasted. While the children were very small, they had dresses made of Jacob's shirt tails. These pioneers struggled to bring about an easier life for their followers. We were well fed, clothed and kept comfortable. We were a happy, well adjusted and influential family in the community due to the careful training and loving discipline of our parents.

Jacob kept abreast of the news and exercised his influence accordingly. He made the living and was a good provider. By the nature of his work much of his time was away from the house. He frequently filled the water bucket before going about his daily tasks. Mother played the greater part in child care while we were infants and toddlers. One of her friends said of her, "She is the salt of the earth." In 1948 she was chosen by "The Kansas Executive Committee" as one of three very distinguished Kansas Mothers.

In 1914 our parents, to accommodate their large family of nine children, built a large new house on the farm. Within a few more years they moved to Protection where they lived until they left this world for a better home.



JEROME WOODS AND 'NETTIE' McNICKLE BERRYMAN

Jerome Woods Berryman, born in Arcadia, Missouri, March 12, 1870, and Nancy Annette (McNickle), born in Brookfield, Missouri, October 11, 1870, and their infant daughter, Dorothy, moved from Elk City, Kansas to Ashland in May of 1900.

Prior to this move, Mr. Berryman participated in the 1893 opening of the Cherokee Strip. He established a bank in Pond Creek, Oklahoma and was its president. He also served as mayor. "Nettie" taught a country school near Cortland, Nebraska at the age of 16. At the age of 23, she and her sister, Mary, went to the Cherokee Strip to prove a claim. The McNickle girls ran a millinery shop in Pond Creek and there Nettie and Jerome met.

The meeting culminated in romance and their wedding in Cortland on June 8, 1898. There were five children of this union.

Dorothy, born in Elk City, and Jerome Charles, James Woods, Virginia and George Albert, all born in Ashland. The entire family were members of the First Presbyterian Church where Jerome served as an elder.

Mr. Berryman was a prominent Kansas banker. He served on the board of many financial institutions and was a president of the Kansas Bankers Association. He founded The Home Lumber & Supply Company in 1905. Jerome served for seventeen years as chairman of the Ashland School Board and was a Trustee and generous contributor to the College of Emporia. In 1905-07-25 and 27 he represented Clark County in the State House of Representatives. He was president of the Kansas Historical Society, a member of Wichita Consistory, the Shrine and past master of

the Masons.

Mrs. Berryman devoted much of her time to her family. She was an active, devoted and valued member of her church. She participated in the social life of the community through her membership in Ashland Study Club, D.A.R., P.E.O., O.E.S. and in the mandolin society of the early days. Her children and grandchildren are fortunate to have inherited some of her musical ability. Nettie, with her sprightly personality, her love of people and interest in the world around her, and Jerome, with his quieter ways, his sound judgment and his friendly chuckle over a joke, were a couple who complemented each other. Jerome died in April, 1940 and Nettie in March, 1957.

Ashland is left with many reminders of this early day couple in addition to their five children who have also enriched the community.


