"The marriage of well known and popular young couple of Clark County took place New Year's Day, 1927, when Mr. Charles Paul Salyer and Miss Estella Marguerette Brown were united together at Woodward, Oklahoma." (CCC, January, 1927)

Paul, a native of Lamar, Missouri, was born July 5, 1900, and moved to Clark County, Kansas, with his parents, Alice Morse and Darwin Salyer, natives of Missouri and Illinois, in December of 1915. Paul graduated from Ashland High School in 1920, attended the College of Emporia, and taught school in Clark County for seven years. During high school and college he was known for his athletic endeavor in football and track and remained a sports enthusiast throughout the years.

Estella was born February 8, 1901, in Wichita, Kansas, the daughter of Modesta E. O'Bryan and V.W. Brown, formerly of Breckenridge and Meade County, Kentucky. Mr. Brown located in Wichita, Kansas, in 1879, moved his family to Commanche County in 1902 and then to Harper County, Oklahoma in 1906. Estella was educated at Mount Carmel Academy, Wichita, Kansas, graduating in 1920. She attended Northwestern Teachers College, Alva, Oklahoma, and taught six years of rural school in Harper County, Oklahoma and Clark County, Kansas.

Paul and Estella purchased the Armand Baker Farm on State Lake Road north of Ashland which they called "Red Cliff Farms." On this farm and other land purchased in succeeding years, they were known for their fine herd of Registered Hereford Cattle and quality quarter horses.

As active members of their church, St. Joseph's, and community, Paul assisted in the establishment of Farm Bureau and served on the board for many years. He was active in the organi-

zation of the Ashland Cooperative and served on that board, and was involved in the consolidation of the rural school districts of Clark County. He was a member of the Sons of the Revolution and Living Descendants of Royal Blood. Estella was the director of St. Joseph's Choir for forty years and a member and officer of Altar Society and Daughter's of Isabella. She was a member of the Clark County and Kansas Geneological Society, a charter member of the Ladies Contract Bridge Club and a charter member and secretary-treasurer of the Clark County Quarter Horse Association.

Together, Paul and Estella were professionally involved in numerous livestock and quarter horse associations, the Clark County Historical Society and played bridge with several couples' groups from which lasting friendships were formed.

Paul's children and grandchildren have been the inheritors of fascinating stories of growing up in Missouri and his young manhood in Clark County. He was also a frequent visitor and story teller on Ashland Main Street and in the local coffee-bars when retirement allowed him to make twice-a-day trips to town.

Estella, small but energetic, could ride a horse, cook a meal, teach a class, or plant a field--all in one day if necessary. Always a lover of the outdoors and animals, she pursued her days in this manner. Tom, currently the owner and operator of Red Cliff Farms, Inc., graduated from Kansas State University. Sharon, also a graduate of Kansas State, teaches primary education in Boulder, Colorado. Ivan, a graduate of New Mexico State College, Las Cruces, is the president of First Mortgage Corporation, a subsidiary of 1st National Bank, Wichita, Kansas. Mary Cecilia, a graduate of Wichita State University, currently resides in Ashland, where she and her husband operate the G-Mart convenience store.

PORTER SEACAT FAMILY

Porter Seacat came to Lexington Township in 1884 from Cowley County, Kansas, to pre-empt land (present site of Seacat Feed Yard). Returning to Winfield, he married Kisiah Bookwalter, July 5, 1886, and brought her to his farmstead where they farmed and raised cattle and hogs. He was a frugal man and she a good helper in their endeavors, and they soon became self-sufficient and in time accrued over 2000 acres of Clark County land.

Born to Porter and Kisiah were Gracia, July 15, 1887; Robert, April 28, 1889; Fred, October 10, 1890; and Dona (Fox), January 29, 1895. All finished eighth grade at Coyote School.

Kisiah Seacat died January 18, 1917, during the terrible influenza epidemic.

Fred served in the United States Army hospital section (WWI)

and died of lobar pneumonia October 3, 1918, upon landing at Brest, France.

Gracia Seacat attended Kansas State Teachers' College, Emporia, and taught in the Clark County rural schools until 1921 when she and Porter moved to Los Angeles, California, for the winter, returning the following year when she began teaching there and he bought property. Gracia retired in 1948 and lives in Los Angeles.

Porter married Mathilda Cooper in January, 1928, and lived in Los Angeles until his death, March 15, 1933.

After Fred's death, Porter deeded to the city of Ashland a farm he had originally given his son. The proceeds from it were to be used for the upkeep and beautification of Highland Cemetery where all three are buried.



ENOCH AUSTIN AND ANNABELLE (BOOTES) SHATTUCK

In 1883, at Tombstone, Arizona Territory, E.A. Shattuck and other Erie, Pennsylvania men organized the Erie Cattle Company, which became one of the larger cattle operations in southeast Arizona and over the border in Old Mexico.

In 1885, E.A. Shattuck and Annabelle Bootes of Waterford, Pennsylvania, were married.

In 1892, because of severe drought in Arizona, the Erie Cattle Company shipped cattle into Clark County, leasing a large range in western Clark and eastern Meade Counties, with headquarters at what had been New Cash City. E.A. Shattuck came east with these cattle, settling in Ashland, and engaging in the ranching business until he died in 1911. Belle Shattuck helped to organize the Ashland Study Club and was a charter member of that group. A graduate of Edinboro Normal School, Edinboro, Pennsylvania, she was an artist of some ability. She died in 1920.

purchased a quarter section of subirrigated land on the Cimarron with a new comfortable sod house 40 x 14 with two rooms.

They had come to Clark County in 1885 from Albany, Mo., shipping their belongings to Wellington by train and the rest of the way in covered wagons. Ellen plans retirement within the year, and they look forward to living at their summer home in Stowe, Vermont.



Joe Steinbach said he came to Sitka, Kansas, when the sun dogs were pups. He was born in Oklahoma in 1870 and died in 1953.

Early days he helped to build brick buildings in Caldwell, Kansas. Once he resided at the Sitka House.

He leased the Ravenscraft Ranch and with other holdings, ranched extensively. Joe settled down on the same section as the Frys, and if he had not shared his feed with them the winter of 1911 and 1912 when snow drifted over fences, our livestock would have perished. His "shack", as he called it, still stands with

crumbling walls. Joe never had a car but he was a familiar sight with his pipe and his horse, Shorty. He spent much time in the homes of A.R. Baker, H.B. Fry and D.J. Hicks and when he moved to Ashland, with the Ben Bowlings.

A meal invitation to his home was a rare treat. We always knew the menu, mulligan stew and for dessert all kinds of cooked dried fruit. A throwback to cowboy days! When Joe didn't show up at the Bakers for over a couple of days, Amos decided to check on him. He looked in the window and there lay Joe in bed. Amos went in the house and as he leaned over Joe, he opened his eyes. Amos would say he didn't know who was the most surprised, Joe or himself.

B.L. STEPHENS FAMILY

In the spring of 1885, Benjamin L. and Lula K. Stephens came by railroad to Harper City, the farthest point in this part of the state. They traveled by stage to Anthony, then by way of the Prairie Schooner to Buff Creek, Clark County. They located on government land in the northeast corner of the county, building a small two-room house, a storm cave, a sod stable, and sod hen house.

In 1886, B.L., with others, organized and platted the townsite of Lexington, Kansas, named for Lexington, Kentucky. They put their little house on wagons and moved it down to the town. One of the most thrilling rides ever, when Lula stayed in the house during the three mile drive and cooked dinner for the men, not knowing how to gauge appetites, long on willingness but short on biscuits. B.L.'s store building was the first house erected. He was the town's first inhabitant and the last one to leave in 1896, moving his stock and goods to Ashland, conducting a general store until 1909, when he retired from active business.

During B.L.'s business career, he never refused credit to anyone, often accommodating a single person with credit to the extent of \$2000.00, carrying many of his customers two to five years. Besides his mercantile business, he was extensively engaged in farming in Clark County with farms in Missouri and Oklahoma. B.L. gave much attention to raising thoroughbred horses and also a large number of mules.

Benjamin Leonard, son of John and Emily Rice Stephens, was born December 10, 1855, and married Lula Kendall, born October 10, 1858, daughter of Edward and Sarah During Kendall, May 19, 1885. One son, John Edward, was born January 7, 1889 at Lexington and died at his summer cabin on June 23, 1957 at Estes Park, Colorado.

More detailed information on B.L. and Lula has been recorded in several volumes of Early Clark County, Kansas and Encyclopedia of State History (Embracing Events).

Mr. Stevenson was possibly the oldest Kansas Abstractor and Dean of Morticians of the state during the 66 years he served the Ashland area so capably. Things that were important to building character, like: walking after the milk cows, hauling in kindling and coal, pumping water, stifling heat, flies, muddy roads and walking two hundred yards to the outhouse, studying under the light of a coal-oil lamp and telephones that had to go through "central" with more than one party on the line, whereas we had to repeat it several times because of the drop in power and increase of interference.

My education began in a little one-room school house at Sitka which was located just south of the larger one that is now the Sitka Social Club. It was really a big deal to move up to the big school building after the second grade. We had many memorable

times there even though several grades were taught by the same teachers at the same time. Some really "mean" teachers like Miss Redding, Miss Pittman and Mrs. Yeager, who got it across to us one way or the other. Sometimes it was the other with students like myself and Oliver Shupe, my buddy who went all the way through high school with me.

We were forced to go to Ashland when we reached the 5th grade, which made twenty-five kids in one class and how they taught that many at one time seemed impossible. We found new friends and more tough, stern teachers like Mr. Sheppard, Mr. Reitz and one woman teacher who could swing a mean paddle.

Living that far from school meant long rides on a school bus with very patient bus drivers who learned not to look back for fear of what they might see. Never knowing what to expect out of kids like myself, Donny Howell and brother Jack, who would have a dare of one kind or other. Crawling out one window and back in the other while the bus was moving and driver not looking was even possible to happen.

Our high school days were not forgotten by most teachers as they were an experience for both of us. If anything happened

My lovely wife, Nila, the former Nila Price of Protection, Kansas, works at National Gypsum Co. We are both active in community, church, as well as government here and enjoy the people. Dr. Taylor would travel all over the county as well as some adjoining counties and down into what was then Indian Territory to see those who were sick. Ella would accompany her husband on many of his calls. If necessary, she gave the chloroform used in operations and at births would bathe and dress the baby and return each day until the mother was able to do so.

Being a Kentuckian, he loved horses. Regardless of the weather, he would come any hour of the day or night in his buggy with his snappy team.

He was a great reader and kept informed of new medicines and

treatments. He acquired a heart condition and practically had to give up his practice. He died February 10, 1928 while resting in his chair. That morning he had driven to Sitka at someone's urging. Ella followed him in death December 1, 1933.

CLOYD AND DAISY VALLENTINE

The following appeared the *Clark County Clipper* November 6, 1902, "John Cloyd Vallentine and Daisy Fox, both of Lexington, were married last Sunday evening at 6 o'clock. These young people were amongst the most popular in the Lexington community where they had lived most of their lives."

Cloyd was born June 12, 1881 in Morgan County, Illinois to John Major and Mary Jane Vallentine.

Daisy was born November 27, 1883 at Chelsea, Kansas to Millard and Ida May Fox.

A week after the couple were married, Major and his family moved to Ashland, leaving the young couple the sole occupants of the family farm. After their marriage, Cloyd not only farmed and raised cattle but he did carpenter work in the community. Before moving to Ashland, Major donated the land and had contracted to build the Lexington schoolhouse. Cloyd finished the building in 1903.

Cloyd held various public service offices; serving on the school board, Township Clerk and Treasurer and served as County Commissioner from 1935-1947. Cloyd and Daisy boarded most of the teachers who taught at the Lexington school.

They were Methodists and took an active part. Cloyd served as Treasurer many years and Daisy was a dedicated Sunday School teacher of the primary students. In 1939, Cloyd was one of the major planners and developers of the new Church of God. They both gave a lot of their time and support to this project.

The Vallentines had six children: Jennie May married Virgil Crane; John Fillmore married Venna Wilson; Lenora Anna married Charles Waugh; Thelma Daisy married Ralph Hamilton; Ruth Helen married Merle Pike; Roy Earl married Sue Wallace; the last two children being twins. All were born at the rural home.

On October 1, 1947, Cloyd bought a small home in Ashland and a month later moved from their rural home of 45 years. Daisy died of cancer August 15, 1949 and Cloyd died May 3,

1966 after a long illness.

In 1929, Cal and Mary Ann retired from the farm and moved to the northwest edge of Ashland. They operated a plant nursery on the small acreage there. During World War II, Cal was employed as a mathematician for the Air Force in Garden City.

Calvin died August 20, 1951, and Mary Ann died November 21, 1951. Kathryn and George are still Ashland residents and Harry lives in Medicine Lodge, Kansas. All three children have celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary, which is a tribute to the love and devotion of the family.

NATHAN J. AND MARY JANE ROUS WALDEN

Nathan J. Walden was born July 2, 1847, in Switzerland County, Indiana. He was the son of Solomon and Betty Cotton Walden.

On June 9, 1868, he was united in marriage with Mary Jane Rous, daughter of Captain Percy Rous and Mary Cole Rous, in Switzerland County, Indiana. She was born August 21, 1844, in Switzerland County, Indiana.

To this union were born four children: John R., Percy E., Betty B., and Effie P.

The family came to Winfield in April, 1884. In September, 1884, he came to Clark County and located a claim about 6 miles southwest of Ashland, the W½ NE¼ and W½ SE¼ of Section 32, Township 33 South, Range 23 West. He returned to Winfield and on October 27 loaded up his family and possessions, and on November 3, 1884, they camped on their claim, having taken 7 days to make the trip with a team and wagon. The next day he went to Clark City and bought lumber for a house, 12' x 18', which he and his friends built.

After the Ashland townsite had been platted, the Ashland Town Company gave Mr. Walden one lot and he bought another on which he built his blacksmith shop. He continued to live on his claim and either walked or rode horseback to work nearly every day.

The Ashland Town Company gave Mr. Walden two residence lots and he bought two more on the corner of Maple Avenue and 10th Street; and before he made final proof on his claim, he had a 16' by 24' house built, planted a garden and the family moved to Ashland in 1885. This house was the fourth house built in Ashland.

Mr. Walden was on the City Council, also Mayor, and a member of the school board for several years. In 1891, he was elected County Commissioner on the Democrat ticket and served for four years.

In 1896, Mr. Walden sold his blacksmith shop and bought several quarters of land, leased more and engaged in the cattle business.

He was a charter member of the Layfield Odd Fellow Lodge and a member of the Ashland Masonic Lodge.

Mrs. Walden was a member of the First Presbyterian Church in Ashland and also a member of the first club organized, the Em-

broidery Club.

Mr. Walden died May 3, 1906, and Mrs. Walden died January 11, 1912. They were both buried in Highland Cemetery.

CHARLES AUGUSTINE WALLINGFORD

Charles Augustine Wallingford was born in Tolesboro, Kentucky, October 15, 1871, next to the oldest of ten children of Webster Napoleon and Mary Keren (Pugh) Wallingford.

In October, 1884, the family left Tolesboro, on the steamboat LaBelle, for Cincinnati, Ohio. From Cincinnati, they went by train to Winfield, Kansas, where they spent the winter with Charles' grandfather, Samuel B. Pugh.

In January, 1885, Webster Wallingford, with Samuel and John Pugh, left Winfield by covered wagon for Western Kansas to stake out their claims and build houses for their families. The Webster Wallingford claim was located twelve miles southwest of Ashland, on land that is now part of the Roy Duvall farm.


The first home was a 14' by 16' shanty, which was later pulled over a basement. This served adequately during the blizzard of 1886. As crop failures grew more frequent, and the needs of the growing family became greater, they moved to Ashland in the fall of 1890, to the house that yet stands at 705 Highland.

In 1899, Charles started a grain and feed business just south of the home, at the corner of Eighth and Highland, where the Stein dental office now stands. As the business grew, Charles took his brothers into what became Wallingford Brothers. They engaged in farming and cattle raising. Charles operated a Dodge car agency on the opposite corner of the same intersection. Early in the 1900's, Charles, as the senior member of the firm, was a prominent figure in the export of wheat and caneseed to European markets through their offices in Wichita, Galveston, New Orleans and New York. They also dealt in broomcorn, which was freighted to Ashland from a wide area in the Oklahoma and Texas Panhandles. Charles took an active part in civic affairs. He was an elder in the Presbyterian Church, was mayor of Ashland, and served on the schoolboard.

In later years, Wallingford Brothers dissolved and some of the brothers went into business for themselves in other cities. Charles remained, and for many years operated grain elevators at Ashland, Sitka and Acres, Kansas, and Buffalo, Oklahoma. He per-



sonally managed the business until poor health forced him from active management in 1954. His death followed on August 15, 1955, at age 83. The business continued under family management until 1976, when it was sold.

Charles was married June 11, 1902 to Mary Louise Wright, who died February 24, 1914. They had no children, but they adopted Harold and Mildred Mayse, brother and sister, nephew and niece of Mary Wright.

April 16, 1916, Charles married Ruth Naomi Keller in Wichita. They had three children, Mary (Mrs. L.B. Root), born May 14, 1917; Betty Ruth (Mrs. Clyde Sowers), born February 15, 1919; and Nancy Patricia (Mrs. Merle Closson), born February 11, 1920. In February, 1920, Ruth became gravely ill with influenza and other complications. Miss Mable Finfrock, a nurse, was brought out from Wichita to care for Mrs. Wallingford, but she died February 13, 1920, two days after giving birth to Nancy.

Miss Finfrock stayed on to care for the children, but after two years, decided to return to her family home in Virginia. Charles realized that was not what he wanted, so he boarded the next train, meeting her in St. Joseph, Missouri, where they were married June 12, 1922.

Mabel was an extremely capable business woman, a fine home-maker, a very loving and caring mother, a wonderful helpmate through good times and bad. One of her hobbies was raising flowers which grew into a thriving business. Like everything she touched, she made something beautiful of it, whether it was sewing, cooking, raising flowers or homemaking. Mabel died June 2, 1975, at age 91.

Both Charles and Mabel were self-educated. Charles finished the fifth grade, but they both read widely, and there were few subjects they could not discuss intelligently. Both were true Christians in every sense of the word. They lived the Ten Commandments. One of their favorite Bible verses was "What doth the Lord require of thee but to love mercy, to do justly and to walk humbly with thy God." They did just that.

SAMUEL PUGH WALLINGFORD

Samuel Pugh Wallingford was born in Kentucky on August 10, 1884, shortly before the family moved to Kansas. He attended school in Ashland, then taught in northern Clark County for \$35 a month. While he was still in school he worked running the town herd for \$1 per month per cow. He earned more than his father did who was working in Ben Stephen's store. He also worked for the farmers and cattlemen when he was 15 for 50 cents a day working from sunup to sundown. One winter he clerked in the general store and sold eggs at 5 cents a dozen, frying-size chickens at 15 cents, each, or two for 25 cents, overalls were 35 cents a pair, and shoes were \$2 to \$2.50 a pair. His first "store-bought" suit was purchased after he was able to save \$12.

He worked his way through Southwestern College at Winfield by doing janitor work at the college and singing with the college male quartet. He had often said, "My early training in these times of hardship I count on now as one of my richest blessings, and a heritage that cannot be equalled in our present generation."

He married Miss Gertrude Messenger, a music teacher at Southwestern. They had two children, Frederick Messenger and Molly Katrina (Ettlinger) of Pomona, New York. Fred lost his life at the beginning of World War II.

Sam was President of the Sam P. Wallingford Grain Corporation in Wichita. He was known for his many philanthropies. His ability as a fund raiser was known far and wide. He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church and belonged to many civic organizations, often serving on their boards. Especially was he interested in the YMCA and the Salvation Army. He died on November 17, 1968.

All of Webster Napoleon Wallingford's family are now deceased. If they were still alive one cannot help but wonder what tales they could tell for the "Ashland History Book."

WEBSTER NAPOLEON WALLINGFORD

It was in October, 1884, that Webster Napoleon Wallingford,

his wife, Mary Keren (Pugh), and their six children, Charles, Martha (Matti), Elmer, Mark, Ella and Sam, left Tollesboro, Kentucky, to begin their long trip to Winfield, Kansas, first by boat to Cincinnati, Ohio, and then by train to Winfield, Kansas. Webster had heard that Kansas was known as the Golden West, the Land of Opportunity. He had fought in the Civil War, and was considered to be a gentleman of means for that time (he had \$10,000 in cash, a general store and he owned slaves although he had fought to free the slaves). The Confederates called such Southerners "Cheap Black Republicans" and they were not too popular with most of their neighbors.

When they arrived in Winfield, Webster left his family there for the winter and after purchasing a covered wagon and a team of mules, he and two relatives moved on west to prove up claims twelve miles southwest of Ashland. He built a four-room house with a basement under one end which was used as a bedroom. His income from a pension was approximately \$19 a month. He freighted with his team of mules from Ashland to Englewood, and hauled lumber from Dodge City to Ashland. The family gathered Buffalo bones which he hauled to Dodge City and sold for \$8 a ton.

Two more children (Earle and Emma) were born in Clark County. As the children finished school, they supplemented the family income by teaching in the schools of Clark County.

According to a letter written by Sam Wallingford, Charles was the "real human dynamo" which kept the family going. He did a great deal of hunting for wild game for food. He worked in a brick yard in Ashland for 50 cents a day. All of the money he earned went for the family's support. They lived largely on salt pork, beans, flour and the game Charles brought in from his hunting expeditions. The family moved to Ashland in 1890.

Sometime before the turn of the century, Charles, along with his brothers, opened the Wallingford Brothers Grain and Feed Company. In its most prosperous days the company had offices in Wichita, Kansas City and Galveston. It was a very successful business, but, as with many others in the Crash of 1929, things became very difficult, and with the huge dust storms which plagued the area during the '30's, life again was quite a struggle for everyone.

EDGAR AND MARY WATTS

For years, Edgar and Mary Watts moved frequently, following the work of his trade, that of harness maker. Finally though in July of 1916, the Watts, with their two children, Lucile, born April 23, 1902, in Yates Center, and Horace, born July 3, 1904, in the same town, moved to Ashland, Kansas, where Edgar worked at driving the ice wagon for the Culp brothers who were relatives of his. Lucile, now Mrs. Charles E. Greene, Jr., remembers the ice wagon as one with a low bed, drawn by a horse that was trained to stand while deliveries were made.

In 1918, Edgar bought the Gem Cafe which stood on the corner north of the present Jack and Jill store. He owned and operated this cafe at various times over the next twelve years, finally selling it for health reasons. There was no air conditioner, a coal stove was used to cook with winter and summer. During harvest, the cafe seldom closed before midnight. Lucile remembers of two times when a train brought 100 farm workers into Minneola out of Kansas City after midnight. The workers had had no evening meal; so, the Watts family opened the cafe, rousted the grocer and the butcher and fed the hungry hired hands.

The Watts had the first Ford sedan in Ashland, around 1919 or 1920. Lucile recalls her father also working at the McNickle Ford Agency as well as doing trucking for the Culps. His last employment lasted until cancer struck him six months before his death in August of 1950 at the age of 76 years.

Mary Watts was a dearly beloved grandmother and a seamstress much in demand. There were no ready-made clothes for women in local stores. Even when some were stocked, they generally had to be altered, noted Lucile, so Mary's skills were always much needed. She died in August of 1964. Also deceased is Horace Watts, who married Leda Mae Mitchell of Ashland in 1922. For 49 years, Horace was an insurance salesman in Pueblo, Colorado. His widow still resides there. Their only son, Paul Kent, lives in Denver.

Lucile Watts attended six schools before moving to Ashland in 1916. She began high school in the old high school (this was in the top story of the old grade school and consisted of a large study hall in which each class was segregated from the other, and three classrooms). Her class started with fifteen students but

graduated 19 in 1920. She remembers there were three families with two or more members in her high school class. This was because farm families waited until the youngest child was of high school age and then sent them all at once, to board in town. During World War I many boys went to work on farms and never returned to finish their education, she recalls. She also remembers one particularly grave incident when she and several others in the school were expelled for dancing at a party held in the home of one of the students. To their disappointment, however, by one o'clock of the same day, their irate parents had succeeded in getting them reinstated. Lucile's class was the first sophomore class in the new high school (the one abandoned in 1966) and her daughter, Margaret, was in the last class to graduate from that building.

In 1922, Lucile married Pierre Pechin. Two children were born to them, Mary Joan, in Wichita in 1923, and Harold in Ashland in 1925, before their separation. Mary Joan is married to Lloyd Stewart of Pratt. They have three children and reside in Abilene, Texas. Harold, who passed away in May, 1968, married Lavonne Turner, a former Ashland Grade School vocal music teacher, formerly of Alva, Oklahoma. Lavonne still lives in Evansville, Indiana, as do several of their five children.
