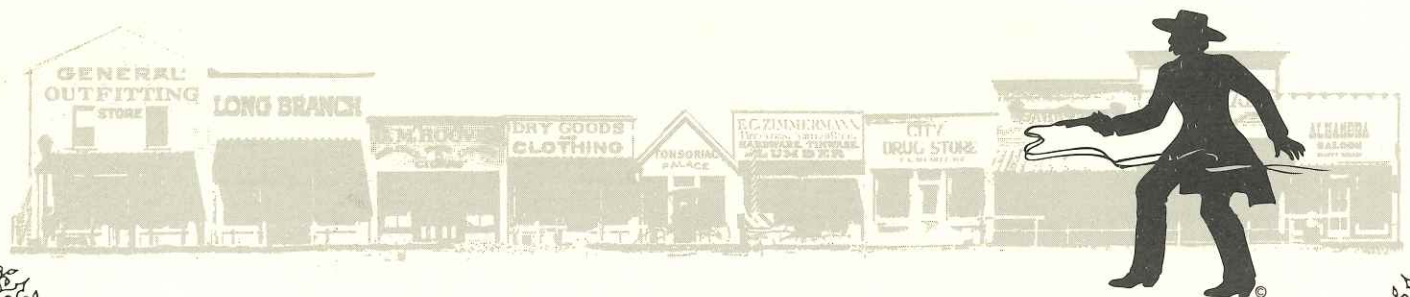

Greetings from Westminster United Presbyterian Church in Campbell, Nebraska!

My name is Pam Johnson, and I am the director of our church's annual Vacation Bible School. Each year we choose a mission project as part of our VBS program. Early on in the planning stages this year, we decided that the people affected by wild fires in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas would be an appropriate place for our mission proceeds to go. You see, here in South Central Nebraska, we also have a predominantly farm/ranch based economy. Most of our congregation has ties to farming and/or ranching. And as far as the children in our community go, if they don't live on a farm, then they have friends or relatives who do. We understand the devastation that you have faced, and can hardly imagine how difficult it would be to overcome such adversity.

In doing some research of the hardest hit areas, I saw the community of Ashland, Kansas mentioned several times. My husband was given the name of a woman at your local bank who was spearheading a foundation for donations. When I called her to explain what we were doing, I told her that we were just a small church and that we were looking for a fund with a "personal feeling." I mentioned that I had been trying to contact the Presbyterian Church in Ashland, and that's when she connected me with a very friendly woman from your congregation. If I remember correctly, her name was Terri Lucky. (I probably spelled that wrong.)

Terri and I had a wonderful visit. It seems that our two congregations are very similar. Both are facing dwindling memberships and an aging population. On an average Sunday, we probably see between 50 – 60 members. Most Sundays, we only have 4 or 5 children in attendance at church. Financing the operations of our church is becoming more and more difficult. Again, we are a rural area, and the farm economy is not great right now. We do have a pastor who serves our church on a part-time basis, and for that we count our blessings.

Another thing we count our blessings for is the fact that our community really supports our Vacation Bible School. This year we had 41 children in attendance, which is huge for our community of 347 people. About half of those kids are in some way connected to our church. The rest are simply kids from the community. Many do not attend church on a regular basis, and I consider VBS as our opportunity to reach out to them and teach them about Jesus. Again, I feel very blessed!

As Terri and I were talking, she stated that with some recent rains, the grass was beginning to grow back and that people were finally starting to feel hope. That statement gave me the chills. You see, the VBS lesson that very day was the topic of HOPE! It was at that moment that I became certain that God had put me into touch with the right person. I strongly believe that God always has a plan. And it was HIS plan that we should dedicate this mission to you.

When Terry told me about the Brett and Katie Shaw family, and how they had lost practically everything in the fire, I KNEW that we had found God's purpose for our mission project. Later that day, I told their story to our children. The fact that Brett and Katie have children who are similar in age really seemed to resonate with our kids. They wanted to do whatever they could to help! The next day our offering was quadruple what it had been on previous days! But it didn't stop there ... they told their grandparents, their neighbors, anyone who would listen. Our VBS theme this year was "Hero Central." The kids learned about what it means to be God's SUPER-HEROES, and I think they really took it to heart.

And that brings us to now. Between children's offerings, other donations, and our annual aluminum can drive, our simple little VBS in our friendly little town was able to raise \$1850.00. It would bring us MUCH JOY if you would please present this money to the Shaw family. You will notice that we did not fill in the name on the check. Our treasurer was not sure of the name, so he left it blank for me to fill in. My husband and I were discussing this (we are farmers/ranchers also), and we decided that we would hate for the Shaw's to have to pay income tax on our donation. We are hoping that you will be willing to cash this check in your church's name, and then present our gift to the Shaw's in the form of cash.

You will notice that this package also contains a small gift for Addie and Hayden. We hope that it will remind them of their friends up here in Nebraska, and how we are all ONE FAMILY under God.

We wish you all the best, and pray for your community as you continue to overcome the fires. If any of you are ever passing through south-central Nebraska, we would love to have you visit and worship with us!

Doc Bollig Proves He can

When Brother Steve (Doc) Bollig was visiting relatives in Kansas, he read about a major fire in SW Kansas that completely burned an area of about 651,000 acres in 23 counties. 461,000 acres burned in Clark County alone. (Sumner County is 348,000 acres.) Farmers lost everything: cattle, grazing lands, fences, buildings and machinery. Some towns were completely destroyed.

Doc decided to do something about it and contacted a local parish priest in the area and also the local Catholic Charities organization. He then proposed to our council that we make a donation to help those who suffered losses in the fire. A motion was made and approved for \$500.

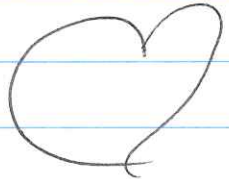



Dear Ashland,

I feel your pain and heartache. My dad was a cattleman.

My Uncle, my dad, and I drag logs from the river bottom with horses. Hand split them to make fence posts. We fenced 900 acres. A year later a wildfire came thru and burnt every post. We saved our cattle but my dad + mom made about 7200.00 a year. It took alot of effort, will power + work to re-fence.

Now I live in northeastern Oklahoma. I am bordered on 3 sides by government hunting ground. We have stopped fires 3 times at our backyard fence. I was an extension agent, and farmers + ranchers came from all over the county to fight fire + get my animals out.

This isn't much. I am sorry. In July of 16 we lost our house in a storm. 150 mile winds. Mike + Christy Potts recorded. \$50.00

Our prayers go out to families and
communities affected by the fires.

My grandparents met fighting a prairie
fire. My grandfathers family was from
Texas and my grandmothers family from
Oklahoma. My grandmother talked of
the dangers of prairie fires. My grandfather
was born in Kansas. He worked for a ranch
and the railroad. After they married they
moved to Iowa to find work and be close
to family.

In 1988 we lost a barn, shed, circle
machinery, feeder pigs and our well to a
fire. Our home was saved with some
repairs. Our fire was small but took all
summer trying to clean up the mess.
